In The Spirit

“Are we having church on Christmas morning?” This is the kind of e-mail I get in August! I had to laugh. We do need to think about it, but still...

That's the thing about church life: we're always a few months ahead of ourselves, or even a few years, as the complex and relational life of the congregation requires pre-planning so that we have adequate time for consideration, discussion, building usage scheduling, maneuvering, strategizing and adjusting. Think about how complicated it is to coordinate your doctor's appointments or the family schedule with a couple of children, then multiply that by about, oh, twenty to one hundred.

What we need to always remember, though, is that the planning and thinking and checking in with each other through e-mails, actual old-fashioned phone calls, one-on-one meetings (either scheduled or grabbed in the moment) committee or team meetings and even texting are not extraneous to the spiritual life of the church, they are actually at the heart of it. It is through relationships, consideration of each other's roles and responsibilities in this living organism, patience and forgiveness when we jumble up on each other, and strengthening our covenantal muscles that shift from “going to church” to “**being** the church.”

The irony is that we know that the best route to inner peace and joy is to live in the moment, not six months in the future. So we do that, too. We light a chalice when we do our business to remind us that the present moment – not just in explicitly religious or spiritual practice or moments of private reverie – is where we find the holy. The poet Annie Dillard says that our job is to “notice each other's beautiful face and complex

nature so that creation need not play to an empty house.” It will be good to gather together to see your beautiful faces after the summer has flung some of us far apart geographically. It will be happy to see how much our kids have grown, sad to start to get used to the idea that Karen Brown will only be with us for one more church program year before her retirement, and hope-creating to commit ourselves anew to our mission of learning, service and caring.

Can't wait to see you and start another program year!

The water will then be boiled to remove impurities and saved for use in child dedications, commissionings and for the anointing of the dying. When we pour ours into the common vessel, we will be invited to state where it came from and, in a few words or sentences, what it represents to us.

Fresh News about Singing from the British Broadcasting Company

Please take note and remember that singing with our regular and special multi-generational choirs at UUCGL is free and open to anyone. And even if you are not able to do that at the moment, singing hymns with gusto on Sunday mornings will have the same positive effects. For more information, just talk to anyone involved in our music program!

Professor Stephen Clift and Consultant Andrew Patton have provided the BBC with further information on why Singing is Good For You ...

Cortisol:

One study revealed that after just 40 minutes of group singing, cortisol – the stress hormone – had fallen much more quickly than it would with the normal passage of time. Our cortisol levels normally taper off at the end of the day but by singing, the process can be speeded up.

Endorphins:

The act of singing causes the body to release endorphins, which are the body's feelgood chemicals and associated with pleasure. Singing makes us take deep breaths, which in turn increases blood flow around the body and helps increase the endorphins' effect. It's been found that we get a similar endorphin rush when we laugh, or eat chocolate.

Dopamine:

Singing triggers the release of dopamine. This is an important neurotransmitter that is linked to basic human biological needs. One recent study found that we release more dopamine when we hear music which we enjoy. The researchers also found that increased dopamine production was linked to that shiver-down-the-spine feeling we experience in response to singing pleasurable music. Dopamine is also linked to less tangible stimulants such as falling in love.

Oxytocin:

Singers in choirs have been found to produce the hormone oxytocin. Oxytocin is sometimes called the 'love hormone'. We release it when we hug and it enhances feelings of trust and bonding. This could account for why choristers experience feelings of friendship and togetherness when singing as part of a group.

Aerobic Exercise:

Singing is an aerobic activity, and when we sing we draw more oxygen into the bloodstream, improving circulation.

Immune System:

Research with a Frankfurt choir showed that they produced antibodies in the blood which enhanced their immune system.

Growing in Love Faith Development Through the Ages

As I'm thinking about what to write in *THE TIMES*, *Coming Attractions* come to mind. But of course we are a church, not a movie studio. But I like the header, so I'll call it *Congregational Attractions for the Year 2016-2017*. Let's *attract* more people to our congregation this year.

I can't start the attractions until I give a brief philosophical reflection. So here goes! **Congregational life matters.** Our church is a place where all ages meet together and learn together. Why our congregational life matters is not something we naturally think about. I've been in congregations where some people seemed rather uncommitted. But when a big conflict happened, people were angry and sad. It was during the conflict that I realized some people have implicit heartfelt deep feelings about their congregations and they sometimes don't know how much it means to them until there is a belief that it could be taken away. We matter as a church. When we come together at our Ingathering, think about how this congregation matters to you when you put your waters into the common bowl. We are better together.

Congregational Attractions for the Year 2016-2017

Ingathering – September 11th – Bring some water from your travels far away or close to home.

Church Programming Starts – September 18th.

We have a special guest coming to engage our congregation of all ages in the life of the Monarch Butterfly after we grab a snack at Fellowship Hour. We might even get to see a few live butterflies and if we are lucky, caterpillars.

Monthly Forums – We are trying to find a new name; but basically, once a month we will offer programming – social and eco justice, spiritual, the natural world, etc. The Ministry Teams will be planning some of the forums. If you have ideas, please talk to me.

All-Ages Worship Services – Ingathering, Animal Blessing, Thanksgiving, Holiday Service, Faith Development Sunday, Easter, Earth Day, Youth Sunday, Beach Service. (A few of the All Ages Worship Services will have an activity for younger children after the first half of the service.) Francie may be planning another musical!

Programming for Children and Youth – Our theme this year is **Connected and Guided by Love**. Our **First Friend's/Little Lights'** (babies through preschool) Room will be open on most weeks. Our **Kindergarten through 5th grade** children will meet every week for Children's Worship and then split off into their classrooms – **Bright Lights (K-2) and Chalice Children (3-5)**. The children will be learning about our Principles and Sources in very engaging ways through worship and activities. Our **6th through 8th grade youth – Breakfast Bunch** - are engaging with Neighboring Faiths this year – visiting congregations around and outside our neighborhood. **Our youth – YES (Youth Enjoying Sundays)** will be meeting in the mornings twice a month engaged in an interfaith UUA Tapestry of Faith curriculum. They will meet twice a month on Sunday evenings and we have already planned their annual trip to spooky Salem in October. We have also planned two soup lunches at Fellowship Hour, and two salad lunches at Fellowship Hour to help fund their trip to General Assembly in New Orleans in June of 2017.

Dialogue Group and Covenant Group

The Covenant Group is a small group ministry. This group meets twice a month at 11:30 am. Small Group Ministry is a way for people to feel more connected and a great way for new people to get to know each other. The Dialogue Group is another way to stay connected. Learning dialogue with Ron Fishman can be a life-changer. The Dialogue Group also meets twice a month at 11:45 am. Please let's talk if you have an interest in the Dialogue and/or Covenant Group.

Activities will pop up throughout the year as the Ministry Teams start planning. Our Ferry Beach Retreat next April is happening and our participation in the Gay Pride Parade and Celebration in Salem. We will plan a Seder. Learn more about our partnership with ECCO – Essex County Community Organization. I hope you will consider attending some of the activities of our church. You might even want to facilitate a program or know someone you think might be a good speaker. If you do, let's talk!

Green Corner Open Space

Starting in September, the Green Sanctuary Ministry Team's theme will be "**Open Space.**" We'll be scheduling a variety of activities, providing information on the benefits of open space, and urging everyone to get outside to reap those benefits!

What is open space? EPA defines it as "any open piece of land that is undeveloped (has no buildings or other built structures) and is accessible to the public." It's also been defined as "an area of land purposefully left undeveloped as a green area." Open space includes parks and conservation land ... Phillip Beach Park in Swampscott is one example, Lynn Woods Reservation another. But smaller areas count too! The neighborhood school yards, and play grounds are also examples of open space.

Why is it important? Green open space is essential not just as habitat for wildlife and our own leisure activities, but studies have shown being out in nature provides mental and physical health benefits. Natural places also give us a sense of spiritual renewal and a feeling of harmony with both nature and our fellow beings. Starting in the Fall, we hope you'll come explore open spaces with us – both physically and spiritually!

Everybody needs beauty as well as bread, places to play in and pray in, where nature may heal and give strength to body and soul alike.

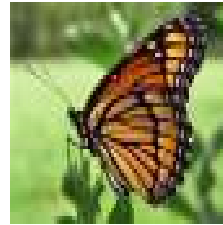

Lynn Woods Reservation (founded 1881) is a 2,200-acre municipal forest park located in Lynn. The park encompasses nearly one-fifth of the entire land area of the city and represents a significant natural, watershed and public recreational resource in eastern Massachusetts.



The entire portion of the reservation with Lynn city bounds was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1996 as a historic district. (A small portion of the park is actually in neighboring Saugus.)
